# **Presidents Page**

In February 1994 I joined the group, and in March 1994, South Cheshire Advanced Motorcyclists was set up as a stand-alone IAM bike group from the then, Cheshire Car group, I like most of us joined to improve my riding skills, having ridden for many years, not necessarily well, but survived the ordeal and having reached the age of forty, and my farther being in hospital having suffered a stroke, knowing he hated me riding bikes it was time to show him I was being sensible and taking responsibility for my actions.

The course was different to the system we have in place today but all the riding requirements were the same, I was allocated my Observer Derek Gray and he gave me the guidance and showed me the system of motorcycle control. I would go and visit Dad and give him a detailed breakdown of each session, he listened and made all the right noises at all the right times, it made me feel good and he had comfort knowing I was trying to be as safe as possible, unfortunately Dad died in the April and never got to hear how I became the first South Cheshire Advanced Motorcyclists associate to pass the Advanced test.

Like many of you who have followed, after the intensity of the course, the elation of passing the test and becoming an advanced rider, or should I say starting out as an advanced rider, there was a feeling of deflation, what now, I had choices, ride with group and enjoy being safe with like minded motorcyclists, yes that was good, but I was left feeling I wanted more, I wanted to give something back and the only way to do that for me was to become an observer, so in 1995 I undertook Observer training and became an observer, the enjoyment of seeing riders improve and become advanced motorcyclists due to some guidance form me was totally uplifting and rewarding, I think it is fair to say I threw myself into the group getting involved at all levels, I became Chairman and Chief Observer for many years, then it was time for others to step up to the plate and take over the helm, John Scanlon became Chairman and in 2015 I stood down as Chief Observer and Chris Mannix took over, John Scanlon moved to France and Mark Rogers became Chairman, Mark and Chris have taken the group into a whole new era and continue to do so.

In industry they have a saying "being kicked upstairs" I know what this means, for services to the group I was honoured to be asked to become the group President, a position with no power, no responsibility, but an honour I was proud to accept, a position I am proud to hold.

I know those of you that have read this far, are probably thinking is there a point to this, yes, March 16<sup>th</sup> is the twenty third AGM the time when Committee members are elected to serve, you don't know what you may achieve until you try it, but unless you try it you will never know, likewise Observer training, when the next Observer training course is announced think about it, better to try and decide, rather than just think what if, don't be shy, ultimately the decision is yours.

# **Destination Dealer - This Month - CMC Motorcycles - Clay Cross**



New theme for a monthly ride out, find a dealer that we have not been to before and plan a little route to get there and back. This month its CMC Motorcycles Clay Cross – High Street Chesterfield Derbyshire S45 9DP.

This month's destination dealer was decided by the weather and the promise of a good clothing selection to look at and maybe purchase?

Sunday morning and meeting at McDonalds Congleton the Cardiac Kid and myself set off early to avoid the incoming "Storm Ewan" The wind was blowing already but no rain to add to the wet roads from the overnight soaking. We meandered through Congleton centre and out on the A54 through the Bosley lights and up and over Dumbers with its smooth surface making it easier to pick a good line through its rising set of corners while keeping an eye on a fair amount of debris on the road from the rain and farm traffic. Past the Ice Cream farm with no thoughts of stopping for a cone we entered the 50mph average speed limit zone, easy to sneak over this while enjoying the A54 but some tight corners to bring the average down. The wind was blowing over the top so maximum concentration was needed to keep the bikes in line and on the right side of the road. We picked off a few cars on the way down towards Buxton where we turned right then left towards Grin Low Road and the big dipper "Harpur Hill" well the Low grinned alright!

We crossed over the A515 towards Chelmorton and veered right onto Flagg Lane again quite open and side winds tugged at the bikes, could be the first time I have got my knee down going in a straight line here I thought! Into Bakewell safe we headed out on the A6 through Rowsley and off the A6 onto some nice back lanes and more climbing towards Clay Cross before getting to the dealer. On the main street and very little built up area to negotiate. Plenty parking available so in we went.



Well this is a good size dealer all right, nice and bright and well laid out..... wait there's a café? Well CK needed feeding so first stop was a VMAX Breakfast – did I say it is a Yamaha Dealer? Well the breakfast gives it away. All revved up we then had the staying power to peruse all the bikes on display new and used all laid out easy to view not too cramped together. I was glad of the space as an over enthusiastic customer was taking delight in telling us about his bike proudly sitting in the showroom with a plastic cover on it so it would not get dust on it till he picked it up! Leaving CK to listen more I swerved into the clothing section.

Big Sale signs signalling 60% off looked promising for a bargain, summer gear was on my watch list and a Dainese Jacket in red and black looked promising at over half price £119 a true bargain but just not enough to get this highlanders wallet out. Although a good selection of gear was on display from a variety of manufacturers there was not a lot of what I was looking for, maybe when the sale is over they will make an appearance. So no sale from me but I did not feel short changed with the visit so if you are a Yamaha fan or just need a destination with a café and bikes with some good roads to get there and a round trip from the Crewe area about 100 miles then give it a look.

We headed out on a more southerly route back home towards Matlock on the A615 then into the Peak District by Brightgate, Newhaven and Hartington again with the crosswinds picking up on the open moor roads. The Peak District roads are more technical than say over in Wales where it is more open and smoother, I like the balance here and being precise with positioning and forward observation rewards you with safe progress. Hulme End and Warslow, little villages with a little number of quaint properties were dispatched while heading towards the A53 and the Roaches in the foreground. Down to Meerbrook and passed Tittesworth Reservoir to go up the famous "Gun Hill" well to the lycra crowd anyway! I think in its present condition it will become famous for its atrocious surface which is a disgrace. Going up is safer than the down direction so over we went and another up down rollercoaster by Rudyard Lake and Reads Lane to Congleton.



### Product Review - ScotOiler FS 365 by Mark Rogers

# Product Review Scottoiler FS 365

Let's face it, we all like our pride and Joy to look smart and bikes are much more susceptible to rust and road salt these days than cars. I have been using Scottoiler FS 365 on my bike for the last 4 years and have been delighted with the results. It is a blend of mineral oil, anti corrosion additives and water which is biodegradable. It does not leave any sticky residue and as claimed by the manufacturer the protection seems to increase with use as a protective barrier builds up. I have used in on my 2012 Suzuki (not known for a weather resistant finish !) and covered 14,000 miles in all weathers throughout the year including snow in April. The bike still looks new with no 'furring' on those vulnerable bolts or banjo fitting and no sign of rust anywhere. I apply after each wash when the bike is still wet, initially I used a cloth and wiped it on, but these days I just tend to spray it on including all the nooks and crannies which is much easier and guicker. A litre bottle lasts me about a year and costs about £8 a go, so good value considering how well it works. Recommended.


# ANNUAL GENERAL METING
