The Dirty Motorcycle on Clean Fuel Session

I had this voucher burning a fossil free hole in my sock drawer since I received it at Christmas, so it was about time I used it before it lost its charge. E-SCAPE at Preston Brook Cheshire was the venue and the Cardiac Kid who had organised the morning and most of the vouchers set the date for our Saturday morning in September. It was going to be interesting as we had already been to an off-road experience in Wales the year before so it would be interesting to see the differences with an electric bike. We all gathered at the venue which offered a café full of drinks and snacks for before and after your sessions on its red dirt track which had found its way into the café! We were provided with boots, helmets, gloves and knee/elbow pads with loose fitting jeans/sweatshirts ok to wear.

We were a mixed bunch of experienced bikers and novices and "I rode bikes twenty years ago" experts! We all had the same package so we all gathered round at the starter circuit to get to know the bikes which were KTM Freeride-E Electric Motorcycles, their operation was simple a mix of motorcycle controls, right hand throttle, mountain bike brakes on the handlebars with an on off switch with different power modes.

We were then all let loose on the beginner's loop to get used to riding off road on dirt and standing up learning to stay upright and looking forward rather than just in front of your front wheel! Now this was difficult when you all had to go at the pace of the slowest rider in front on this tight little circuit. We had a couple of stops where they went into more techniques for riding off road like keeping your leg out in front of you to help you keep upright if you started to slide, not likely to happen here but very likely to get shouted at for poor form at 5mph!

Next up was "Super-Charge" a 20-30 minute session on the "advanced Circuit" going round sections and stopping to have each one explained to you on how you should tackle each one, this was very informative and better than just being let loose on the circuit not knowing what to expect round the next corner.

The course was very narrow for the most part apart from one straight where you had the space to overtake. The bends were tight and narrow with some berms on the outside to enable you to take some of the corners with a bit more vroom.

Now all clued up we were then let loose on power stage one of three which for the tight course was in the most part enough until the one straight where you had to wring the power out of the battery to get past a slower rider. The course was explained as a mix of Motocross, Enduro and BMX type riding designed to be easy to ride but still technically challenging as your confidence and speed increases.

It was great to not have to think about gears and clutch control as you wound your way around the track being able to concentrate on your lines and speed ready for the next corner which was coming up every couple of seconds. I still found myself using my phantom rear brake that did not exist even with my left hand using the lever at the bar!

The power was easy to use, and the bikes did accelerate nice and fast considering the power level they were set on, there was no engine braking, so you had to get used to that as well. The circuit had a couple of sections with jumps on that you could have some airtime on, but you had to be careful as there was not a lot of time from landing to the next corner! Our expert from twenty years ago decided to get over two jumps at once and for some reason did not try it again! This was a great little introduction to E bikes and off-road riding and was definitely suitable for all abilities with the staff friendly and accommodating. You could have extra twenty-minute sessions to add to your day for £20 a time – you may have to wait for your bike to be recharged though.

The Balkans: Croatia – Bosnia – Slovenia – Part Two

Day four and we are now well on our way towards the Balkans and all ready for the off to head east on the A4 towards Trieste a guick sixty miles to get us towards the Slovenia border. We were right into the hot weather now and it was not long before it was nearly 30 degrees again so our first stop to get our Slovenia Vignettes, we were topping up on our water supplies rather than the usual coffees. Into Slovenia we were heading towards todays tourist destination of the Postojna Caves one of the largest caves in the world. Not a caveman myself just a little Neanderthal! I was mostly looking forward to a nice bit of cool air for a bit. Well I was a bit surprised how big the actual caves were with more trains to take you deep into the caves than Euston Station! I can see how they have managed to get thirty-eight million people down there. Once off the train it was a mile or so to walk around the furthest caverns with a guide giving plenty information on the history of the caves. The caves were created by the Pitka River and are 24,120 m long and down 115 m. It is two million years old, ten degrees (cool) 95% humidity. It even has a concert hall! Out of the caves into the baking heat we had a quick bite to eat for lunch before getting on our way through Slovenia and the outskirts of the capital Ljubljana then onto the Croatian border at Babno Polje. Well into Slovenia we were now getting to the Plitvicka National Park where our hotel for the next two nights was situated nice and rural.

The hotel was very homely, and it had a very welcome pool and bar area where we were able to cool off and rehydrate after the hot day we had just had. The next day was a rest day and you could have visited the Plitvice Lakes National Park but CK and myself wanted to keep riding rather than a hot slog round a lake or two! Route downloaded we were off to the Croatian coast. We headed south towards Starigrad and had a brilliant time on some cracking roads nice and quiet, great surfaces, bends and views which were the best of the tour so far then got even better as we approached the coastline and the Adriatic Sea came into view with stunning views of the offshore islands and the road winding down to the coast we just had to stop and soak it in before enjoying the hairpins down to the coastal road and for us to head north on another cracking road hugging the coast.

Time for lunch and a stop at a little sleepy coastal restaurant for a salad before we had to get on the bikes to continue on this great route, we were lucky enough to be on. We got to our northernmost point at Senj where we were now heading east inland back towards the hotel on some more rural roads, some more rural than others as we found ourselves on an unclassified bit of tarmac where we had to play the dodge the local car not expecting other vehicles to be on their road game! Game completed without loss of life we got back to the hotel where poolside we were giving it our best "you missed a cracker of a ride" talk! It was not a difficult task! A nice evening was had with some homely food to go with a few drinks to end a fine day in Croatia.

We had gone out the day before to the Bosnian border to get our green cards for a reasonable ten euros to save time today as it was only ten miles from our hotel, so it was an easy crossing into Bosnia and its very green countryside. It was a very casual ride through here as the speed limits were on the low side considering it was very open and lacking much traffic, it did give us time to check out the scenery and the mountains covered in forests green as far as we could see. There was the odd ruined building but not much else here in where you would have expected to see a fair number of cows or sheep grazing but nothing at all! We were sticking to the speed limits as the police here are pretty hot on speeders and every corner had a lower limit on it too, not the most entertaining ride of the trip.






The Balkans: Croatia – Bosnia - Slovenia

A hundred miles in it was time for lunch and we stopped by a nice lake and Moto Plaza Café then on our way a mile up the road to be confronted by the road closed with no prior warning or diversions signposted. Tom the tour guide took it in his stride though, so it was back to the café for some info on getting around this closed road. We were now on the little road skirting the lake wondering where this was going to take us but not to worry, we got back on the main road without resorting to off road activities! We were now going through central Bosnia and rising through the Vranica Mountains a mountain range in the Dinaric Alps rising up to above two thousand metres. The greenery did thin out a bit up high and as we got nearer Sarajevo it did get a lot more populated. Talking of populated I did not think Sarajevo was going to be such a busy city as we went along a four lane carriageway chock full of all sorts of traffic travelling at a snail's pace and as you all know when its hot and it was it was not a pleasant experience for what seemed like a very long time before we reached our hotel in the city centre. Ah time for a bit of air-conditioned room to chill in before dinner, well not before we had to change rooms for the lack of cool air coming out of our first rooms AC unit! Finally, cool!!! Sarajevo is a compact city of a population of 275,000 with a cultural and historic heart and an evening walking through the central streets mingling with tourists and locals alike it made sense that Sarajevo was a place to come too. A nice meal sitting in the narrow streets soaking in the atmosphere was followed by more night-time sightseeing along the Miljacka River and the bridge where Archduke Franz Ferdinand was assassinated in 1914 which sparked World War I.
